If colorectal cancer is highly preventable with screening, and it's highly treatable when caught early, then why is colorectal cancer the second deadliest cancer in the U.S.?

It's a great question with a complicated answer. A lack of knowledge about prevention and limited access to screening has a lot to do with it, and a third of people who could get checked don't. A missed or delayed screening gives colorectal cancer a chance to grow and become more dangerous long before symptoms appear.

- Build a kit to be ready for disasters and emergencies.





DISASTER PREPAREDNESS BE FLOOD READY!

Know Your Risk for Floods

Visit <u>FEMA's Flood Map Service Center</u> to know types of flood risk in your area. Sign up for your community's warning system. <u>The Emergency Alert System</u> (<u>EAS</u>) and <u>National Oceanic and</u> <u>Atmospheric Administration (NOAA)</u> Weather Radio also provide emergency alerts.

Purchase Flood Insurance

Purchase or renew a flood insurance policy. Homeowner's insurance policies do not cover flooding. It typically takes up to 30 days for a policy to go into effect so the time to buy is well before a disaster. <u>Get flood coverage under the</u> <u>National Flood Insurance Program</u> (NFIP).

Preparing for a flood

<u>Make a plan</u> for your household, including <u>your pets</u>, so that you and your family know what to do, where to go, and what you will need to protect yourselves from flooding. Learn and practice evacuation routes, shelter plans, and flash flood response. Gather supplies, including non-perishable foods, cleaning supplies, and water for several days, in case you must leave immediately or if services are cut off in your area.

In Case of Emergency

Keep important documents in a waterproof container. Create passwordprotected digital copies. Protect your property. Move valuables to higher levels. Declutter drains and gutters. Install check valves. Consider a sump pump with a battery.




Barren River District Health Department would like to express our condolences to the family of Mr. Greg Allnutt, 71, who served on the Warren County Board of Health for many years.


